Adding Timelines to Your Genealogy Toolkit

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What is a Timeline?

Timelines are a way of presenting the sequence of events. When linked together, they provide the reader with incredible power to visualize the context of a particular event. Through the use of a timeline, you, the researcher, can better understand the world in which a particular ancestor lived and thus better understand your ancestor and the decisions he or she made. A life history set in a context of the times in which the individual lived is critical to understanding that person's life experiences, their joys and sorrows, their struggles in life and their accomplishments. A person's life can best be appreciated when placed in a context of the times in which they lived. The context of social, economic, political, and entertainment forces give the yardsticks or standards by which people measure themselves.

Steps to Creating a Timeline:

- 1. Gather all records on the family and assemble them by date.
- 2. Create an entry for each record.
- 3. Go back through the records and analyze them; add additional dates.
- 4. Conduct research what was happening historically during the timeframe in which your ancestor lived?
- 5. Add information to timeline regarding historic events.
- 6. Analyze the events that occurred during the lifetime of your ancestors to "brainstorm" how your ancestors may have been influenced by those events.

Purpose of Developing a Family History Timeline:

- Place your family or an individual in history; gain significant insight into the life of your ancestors by learning about the times and places in which they lived
- Give careful consideration to events, circumstances, and situations that probably had an impact on a family or individual
- Help you think like your ancestor
- Point out or focus on any holes in your research or areas that need additional concentration
- Making sense of multi-family relationships; recognize how lives and relationships fit together
- Prove or disprove family stories
- Understand immigration, migration, and emigration
- Stay focused on what facts are needed
- Realize what you do not know
- Distinguish the differences between your ancestor and others with a common or similar name
- Analyze information to identify discrepancies and/or conflicting information
- Acquire a "to do" list of new records to research
- Locate "missing" ancestors

Questions to Ask Yourself:

- What were some of the great influences of the time period?
- What probably distressed or excited your ancestors the most during a given timeframe?
- What conclusions can you draw about how this individual thought about an event?
- What were the predominant articles in newspapers?
- What did magazines from the time period reveal about people?
- What was of interest in art, cultural events?
- What books were popular being read?
- What plays [movies] were popular?
- What records are available during the time period?

Do not ever neglect the WHO, WHAT, WHEN, WHERE, WHY, or HOW of research. And . . . be sure to document all your resources, including those used to place your ancestor in history.
